



Good morning Year 2 ☺

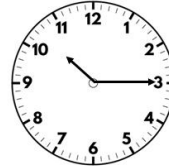

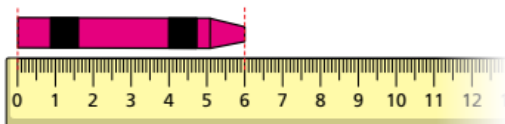

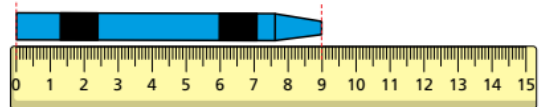

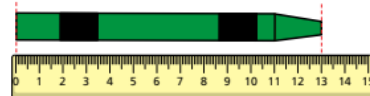

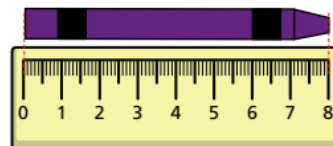
